This week I had a fascinating conversation with Chris Blackshaw. Chris is one of the Church of Scotland's first pioneering ministers. Since 2016 he has ministered to the agricultural community in Ayrshire. He doesn't have a church building – the farmers' market at Ayr is his "office". There, he spends time listening and talking with farmers, their families and many people whose lives are connected to the farming industry. He organises a carol service held each year in the show /sales ring of Ayr market, which sounds a lot of fun. "Farming can be very rewarding but it is hard life and often very isolating, miles from other people," he says. "I have met vets who have told me that they often go back to farms, not to look at the animals but to make sure the farmers are okay."

I asked him about Harvest which is such a special time for farmers, and he sent me this hymn, which gives some new words to a favourite old harvest hymn. Perhaps an adult at home could teach you the tune.... or sing you the verses?
